was hired to review the hotel contract 87 00:06:11,516 --> 00:06:15,649 for a national sporting organization that 88 00:06:15,649 --> 00:06:18,816 hosts international sporting events. 89 00:06:20,000 --> 00:06:23,333 It is an outdoor sport and it 90 00:06:23,333 --> 00:06:27,649 requires specific and conducive weather conditions 91 00:06:27,649 --> 00:06:32,016 and in this case snow and lots of it. 92 00:06:32,750 --> 00:06:35,800 So the hotel contract was being negotiated 93 00:06:35,816 --> 00:06:39,716 to house the athletes and the event staff, 94 00:06:39,716 --> 00:06:43,666 as well as conduct meetings and social functions, 95 00:06:44,566 --> 00:06:48,033 and the organization was hosting two sporting 96 00:06:48,050 --> 00:06:53,149 events back to back at the same sporting venue. 97 00:06:54,500 --> 00:06:57,766 So that's the context. so when I get 98 00:06:57,766 --> 00:07:01,716 the contract, I read it and in my written review,

99 00:07:01,733 --> 00:07:06,949 as I always do, I create two types of comments on the document. 100 00:07:07,750 --> 00:07:10,800 so first I included comments and requests 101 00:07:10,800 --> 00:07:13,966 that were directed to the supplier in this case the 102 00:07:13,966 --> 00:07:17,199 hotel that I knew that the client needed 103 00:07:17,216 --> 00:07:20,633 to have included in the contract to balance 104 00:07:20,633 --> 00:07:24,883 the contract and balance the risk and protect the client, 105 00:07:25,250 --> 00:07:28,666 and I also included comments that were notes 106 00:07:28,666 --> 00:07:32,133 or questions or concerns to the client. 107 00:07:32,149 --> 00:07:39,050 so when I came to the language that referenced force monsieur, 108 00:07:39,750 --> 00:07:44,149 I found very typical boilerplate, 109 00:07:44,149 --> 00:07:48,516 actually short language, and I 110 00:07:48,533 --> 00:07:52,850 debated whether to throw it in the comments, but I don't want any one 111 00:07:52,850 --> 00:07:56,500

knowing that this is good language and I'm not providing 112 00:07:56,516 --> 00:08:01,916 it to you, but I will read what this hotel contract said verbatim 113 00:08:02,266 --> 00:08:04,266 in draft form. 114 00:08:04,266 --> 00:08:07,199 It said this agreement may 115 00:08:07,199 --> 00:08:12,050 be terminated by either party without liability 116 00:08:12,050 --> 00:08:14,500 upon written notice 117 00:08:15,500 --> 00:08:19,016 within five days if a 118 00:08:19,016 --> 00:08:22,916 party's performance under this agreement is subject 119 00:08:22,916 --> 00:08:27,416 to acts of God, war, government 120 00:08:27,416 --> 00:08:31,733 regulation, terrorism, disaster, strike, 121 00:08:33,750 --> 00:08:37,200 civil disorder, a travel restriction 122 00:08:37,200 --> 00:08:41,149 issued by a governmental agency, curtailment of 123 00:08:41,149 --> 00:08:45,216 transportation facilities, or any other emergency

124 00:08:45,233 --> 00:08:49,666 of a comparable nature beyond the party's control 125 00:08:50,266 --> 00:08:53,433 that in each case make it illegal 126 00:08:53,450 --> 00:08:59,083 or impossible to perform its obligations under this agreement. 127 00:09:00,350 --> 00:09:03,399 So this is typical language that 128 00:09:03,416 --> 00:09:06,716 we see, and I am going to repeat it for you, but I don't want to put it down 129 00:09:06,716 --> 00:09:09,649 in writing because it's not sufficient. 130 00:09:09,649 --> 00:09:11,649 It's not bad language. 131 00:09:11,649 --> 00:09:14,916 It's not sufficient language that helps 132 00:09:14,933 --> 00:09:17,566 clients protect their events. 133 00:09:17,933 --> 00:09:21,100 so in essence it said that this agreement can be terminated 134 00:09:21,116 --> 00:09:24,583 by either party without liability, 135 00:09:24,600 --> 00:09:29,566 it had to be written notice within five days of the force measure event,

seems guite narrow, and it had gone on to 161 00:11:11,399 --> 00:11:14,750 say that it had to be of a comparable nature. 162 00:11:15,500 --> 00:11:18,649 Well, in none of that was there a weather related 163 00:11:18,649 --> 00:11:25,366 I'm trigger ah so ah the event was international. 164 00:11:25,366 --> 00:11:29,200 The client needed to be protected against borders closing 165 00:11:30,000 --> 00:11:33,166 against curtailment of international travel, 166 00:11:33,166 --> 00:11:37,299 the inability to secure visa uh entries 167 00:11:37,316 --> 00:11:40,616 for the athletes, and so we needed to 168 00:11:40,616 --> 00:11:44,033 work with the hotel property for them to create 169 00:11:44,033 --> 00:11:47,383 language that addressed those possibilities. 170 00:11:49,250 --> 00:11:52,316 and the client was at a potential risk 171 00:11:52,316 --> 00:11:56,083 of not being able to fulfill its obligations 172 00:11:56,100 --> 00:11:59,866 of this particular contract if the

173 00:11:59,866 --> 00:12:06,216 sporting venue was unavailable due to matters beyond its control 174 00:12:07,250 --> 00:12:11,866 because this was just an housing a contract. 175 00:12:11,866 --> 00:12:14,916 The sporting event was being held elsewhere, and 176 00:12:14,933 --> 00:12:18,533 the force mur clause didn't address anything about 177 00:12:18,533 --> 00:12:22,250 the other facility in the impact of its unavailability 178 00:12:23,000 --> 00:12:26,266 to this contract, so the sport 179 00:12:26,266 --> 00:12:29,916 venue required a scientifically demonstrated 180 00:12:29,933 --> 00:12:33,533 amount of snow to be able to host the event, 181 00:12:33,533 --> 00:12:37,433 so there was a really good strong connection in case it 182 00:12:37,433 --> 00:12:41,383 needed to be made what if the venue was not available? 183 00:12:41,700 --> 00:12:44,816 And my teaching point is you 184 00:12:44,816 --> 00:12:48,233 may um I have heard me talk like if there's if 185 00:12:48,233 --> 00:12:52,133

So that's the second teaching point is that we 211 00:14:32,266 --> 00:14:35,566 move beyond impossible or illegal, and 212 00:14:35,566 --> 00:14:40,366 really advocate for the condition of impracticable. 213 00:14:42,000 --> 00:14:45,233 and then we have the third element that 214 00:14:45,233 --> 00:14:49,366 I asked for, I asked the hotel to 215 00:14:49,366 --> 00:14:52,833 include language that indicated that the client had up 216 00:14:52,850 --> 00:14:56,316 to 10 business days, not 217 00:14:56,333 --> 00:15:01,899 five to invoke the clause after a forced majeure incident. 218 00:15:02,216 --> 00:15:05,750 I worked with associations for my entire planning career, 219 00:15:05,750 --> 00:15:09,583 trying to get major decisions made within five business days 220 00:15:09,600 --> 00:15:12,950 was next to impossible, and we all know how difficult 221 00:15:12,950 --> 00:15:18,350 it can be sometimes to get consensus on emerging situations. 222 00:15:18,350 --> 00:15:21,350 So we expanded, we doubled the amount of

223 00:15:21,350 --> 00:15:24,766 time that decision making could be made by the client. 224 00:15:25,133 --> 00:15:28,366 and then fourth, I asked the 225 00:15:28,366 --> 00:15:31,783 hotel to include language that addressed 226 00:15:31,799 --> 00:15:39,233 partial performance by the client despite a force monsieur event. 227 00:15:40,000 --> 00:15:42,000 So I'm going to repeat that. 228 00:15:42,000 --> 00:15:44,750 I ask them to include language that addressed 229 00:15:44,750 --> 00:15:52,000 partial performance by the client despite a force majour event. 230 00:15:52,733 --> 00:15:56,083 So this language was requested I'm 231 00:15:56,100 --> 00:15:59,750 for the hotel to create to protect the client should 232 00:16:00,649 --> 00:16:04,549 they be impacted by a forced majeure like event, 233 00:16:04,549 --> 00:16:08,799 yet the client still decides to proceed 234 00:16:08,816 --> 00:16:11,816 with a reduced size event. 235 00:16:13,250 --> 00:16:17,333

273 00:18:35,933 --> 00:18:39,400 written document or a documentation to 274 00:18:39,416 --> 00:18:42,883 the hotel that rigorously laid out the 275 00:18:42,900 --> 00:18:47,516 industry standard minimum requirements of natural snow, 276 00:18:48,000 --> 00:18:51,250 their ability to manufacture snow, 277 00:18:51,750 --> 00:18:55,433 and that it could not possibly host two 278 00:18:55,433 --> 00:18:59,266 back to back events while maintaining the 279 00:18:59,266 --> 00:19:03,233 integrity of their product, which was snow 280 00:19:04,549 --> 00:19:07,599 and a base for this sporting event. 281 00:19:07,616 --> 00:19:10,916 So I was able to help the 282 00:19:10,916 --> 00:19:14,566 client put together the business case for them to 283 00:19:14,566 --> 00:19:18,400 invoke the forced mature clause and to request 284 00:19:18,416 --> 00:19:22,916 the ability to proceed with a reduced sized event

00:19:23,516 --> 00:19:26,483 without a negative financial impact. 286 00:19:27,500 --> 00:19:30,650 And so I want to highlight how those 287 00:19:30,650 --> 00:19:34,116 four items that I shared with you how they helped 288 00:19:34,133 --> 00:19:38,083 so the client the first one, the client was 289 00:19:38,099 --> 00:19:41,816 able to cite the sentence that the hotel created 290 00:19:41,816 --> 00:19:45,116 in the negotiated final contract that said 291 00:19:45,650 --> 00:19:49,116 this clause also applies if 292 00:19:49,133 --> 00:19:52,599 the host venue for this event is 293 00:19:52,616 --> 00:19:57,233 unavailable due to matters outside of the venue's control. 294 00:19:58,500 --> 00:20:01,849 That was a sentence that we worked really hard with with 295 00:20:01,849 --> 00:20:05,383 the hotel to protect the fact that the client 296 00:20:05,400 --> 00:20:09,166 was signing a hotel contract that was 297 00:20:09,166 --> 00:20:14,316 contingent on the execution of the actual sporting event.
